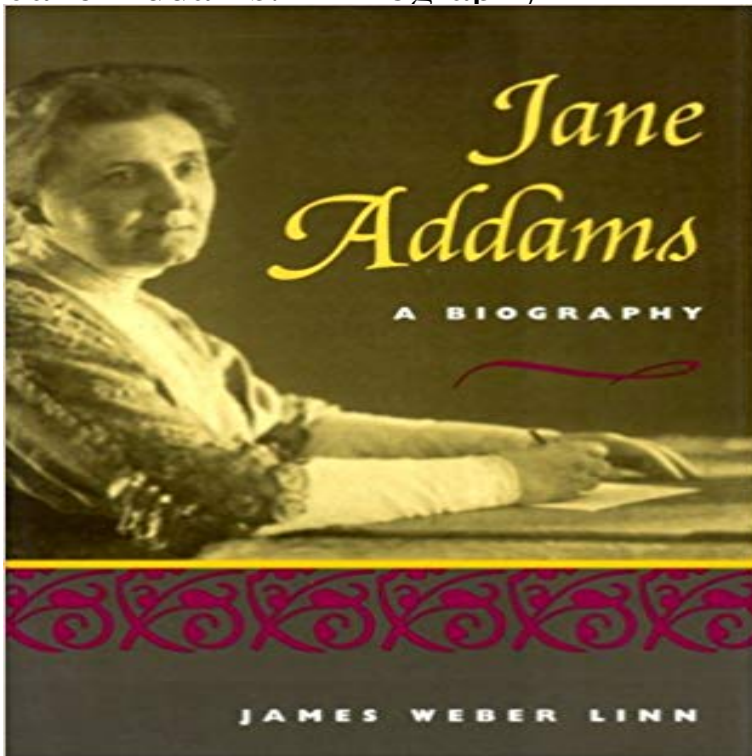


## Jane Addams: A Biography
